MOVING FORWARD WITH WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT





The Pine Ridge Area Chamber of Commerce is focused on improving our local economy. Our experiences have shown us that creating businesses is only half the battle, we also understand that it necessary to develop a skilled workforce for our businesses to survive.

The idea of creating a workforce armed with the unique skills needed to meet the needs of employers in specific region is not new. The first appearances of sustained workforce development appeared in the form of the public-school system. Students were not only exposed to traditional academic subject matter, but also to trades that had made many employable right out of high school.

Today, many of our students who are now looking for work immediately out of high school have the skills to succeed at the college level, but have not always been granted access to educational experiences that would make them employable immediately after graduating.

Our ANA grant has allowed us to enter the school system to bring these skills to our youth. We will be hosting Work Force development trainings at Little Wound and Crazy Horse schools, preparing students for employment. These students will then enter the job market in a couple of months as summer is fast approaching. We expect them to have success in their future endeavors.

While the needs of each economy are different, in the Pine Ridge Area there is an immense demand for workers who are trained to work in the service industry.

The service industry is far more inclusive than many people realize. It can involve the transport, distribution and sale of goods from producer to a consumer, as may happen in electrical work, retail sales, maintenance work, retail sales, and even the healthcare field as many entry level positions require the same skills.

The need for workforce development across South Dakota was echoed by Gov. Dennis Daugaard last week during his final State of the State address.

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DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Chamber Members,

Happy New Year 2018. Hope you all enjoyed the holiday season and endured the very cold South Dakota holiday weather.

AS you may know, we are in our final year of a five year ANA grant. The grant has progressed as we had anticipated and our projects continue to perform well. We are delivering Work Force development trainings at Little Wound and Crazy Horse schools, preparing students for employment. These students will be seeking employment in a couple of months as summer is fast approaching.

Our Tourism efforts continue to develop. We are marketing the reservation from multiple angles. Utilizing cooperative marketing, trade shows and an array of print and digital media. We will do a reprint of the brochure in late summer 2018. If you have a listing in the brochure, be sure to update your information.

The staff at PRACC is gearing up for the annual tourism conference in Pierre, SD January 16-18. PRACC will hold a booth at the annual conference again this year. The booth is a great marketing tool for the reservation and we are able to share information with many people in the tourism industry. We are looking forward to starting 2018 with a bang at the conference.

Our Department of Education grant (NYCP) is on track. We are mentoring nine college students attending school across the country. The students are all doing well and looking forward to their second semester. We are excited to see our mentors bond with the students and build on that relationship. Our high school project will

be starting a new semester soon. New students receiving Work Force Development training.

In May 2017 PRACC was awarded a Black Hills Community Foundation Quality of Life grant in the amount of \$5000. The grant is for youth workforce development and environmental projects. In September PRACC trained and hired four reservation youth for a project. PRACC partnered with Badlands National Park to do an outdoor project in the park. Our youth group worked for three weeks removing fence in the park in preparation for a new fence. The second group worked during the winter break. Four of our college students and two high school students preformed a three week project cutting fire wood. PRACC partnered with a local rancher to clean up pasture area and an old tree grove. The wood was cut, split and delivered to elders in different communities.

PRACC has been awarded a First Nations Development Institute art grant. The grant will provide for an artist in residence project at the Pine Ridge Visitor Center during 2018. This new program will give additional incentive to visit the reservation and to view the beautiful Lakota Culture through art. For those artists on the Chamber list, staff will be in contact with you soon.

Tax season is hear. PRACC will provide volunteer income tax preparation starting the end of January, 2018. Please inform your employees of this free service. VITA saves taxpayers thousands of dollars every year.

"Our state does not have enough workers in skilled

positions," Daugaard said.
Daugaard spoke about his
Career Launch program that will
help high school students with
apprenticeship and job shadowing
opportunities. Daugaard has the
program up and running in three locations across the state.

Daugaard added that he is proposing a plan to allow for licensing reciprocity with surrounding states so that professional licensed in South Dakota can also use them in neighboring states. The Chamber's staff will be traveling to the Governor's Tourism conference this coming week.

Announcing the call to artists for Native POP: People of the Plains, a juried Native art show and cultural celebration of the Great Plains Tribes at Main Street Square, Rapid City, South Dakota on Saturday, July 20 - 21, 2018.

Native POP reinterprets the traditional art market and celebrates the historic and contemporary values of Native artists. Our art market reflects the cultures of the Great Plains including the broadly functional role of art and we embrace all forms of creativity. Both emerging and established Native artists shared their work with thousands of people at last year's event, and we are excited to see the talent and joy our sixth year will bring!

Native POP began in 2013 as the Gathering of People, Wind and Water and changed its name in 2016. The event grew out of an ongoing, large-scale work of public art in granite at Main Street Square, Passage of Wind and Water, and sculptor Masayuki Nagase's themes of hope, transformation and the aspiration of all beings in nature to live in balance.
